The year finished with a Wassail which also brought a lot of visitors. The Trust has enjoyed working with the St Dominica Heritage Trail project and Joe Lawrence has done a lot of publicity on it. The Shamrock, at the Quay, is now open for all to go aboard and find out the history. Last year the National Trust introduced car parking charges and this money helps towards the cleaning up after dogs etc. The trust wished to thank St Dominic Parish for all of its support.

Carolyn Wilkins, as Chair of the Steering Group had met with some of the people and it has been agreed that the public bridleway will be used and the route changed so that members of the public are not being directed on to the red paths.

(Appendix 1) Chairman's Report 2016/17

It scarcely seems possible that it was almost a year ago when I found myself, as a relative newbie on the Parish Council, unable to sit on my hands when no-one else volunteered to take on the role of Chairman after Drew's capable tenure. So, what has happened in my Chairman's year?

We have had the usual trickle of routine planning applications, but nothing quite as exciting as concrete production and wind power. Accordingly, the number of public attendees at PC meetings has usually been in single figures with tonight being the only exception. The long-standing enforcement item has been resolved following the sale of the land on which the famous Yurt was situated.

Lovells has seen the bottoms of the exposed timbers being protected with white plastic socks. Not particularly aesthetic, but strimmer damage was taking its toll and hopefully the socks will provide a few more years of life. It seems likely that, in the next Council Term, action will need to be taken to replace some of the timbers. Many thanks are also due to ClIr Graham Walker, who took it upon himself to repair the roundabout. After copious amounts of research, we managed to work out who had supplied the equipment and order the huge new bearing that was needed, which Graham kindly replaced by himself. Thanks also to Hilary Davis for organising labour to trim the willow structures, which had significantly overgrown, and for volunteering to keep on top of them, weaving them back into shape.

We have also made a start on a makeover of the flower bed above the car park in front of the shop. Efforts are being made to introduce a variety of plants and shrubs with a bee/butterfly friendly theme. Any volunteers who wish to help with the planting and/or weeding, please do contact Jo Totterdell or Diana Greene.

Your Parish Council has a responsibility to maintain its footpaths and to assist with the wellbeing and health of its community. In this connection, most of the Parishioners will be aware of the St Dominica Heritage Trail Project. Sadly, in common with most of Cornwall, we are not well endowed with public footpaths and it has been fantastic to have had the support of the National Trust to use their land and grant permissive access to link up some of our existing paths to make round routes. Green Oak posts have been put up around the Parish and the way marker arrows will be going on them soon. Three interpretation boards have been ordered and will be with us shortly. Two of these are going in the Church Car Park (one describing the walk and the other giving information about the Church). The final board will go down at Halton Quay and will also describe the walk. A new seat will be placed in the Churchyard soon and four broken gates have been replaced. We hope to have a Parish birdbox making day, to promote wildlife around the Parish. We still have a few posts to go in and a little more negotiation to do with the Landowners at one key point, but we really feel proud of what has been achieved. The Parish Council would like to thank the steering committee for their valuable input. I do need to thank Tesco, as without their support, specifically for this project, it would not have happened. Sadly, not all Parishioners have been fully supportive of the Project. One marker post was stolen before it was put in and another was forcibly removed. An anonymous letter was left at The Post Office in the dead of night, objecting to the waste of money on the project. It is a shame that Parishioners do not come to the Parish Council meetings to express their concerns, as the democratic process is there for us to try and meet Parishioners concerns, although it is not possible to please everyone all of the time.

Another incident that I do need to report is an alleged theft by ex-Chairman Potter, or at least that is what it seemed to certain Parishioners. They were most disconcerted to see him, ably assisted by Ivan Cradick, emptying two grit bins for presumed personal gain and then carting both bins away! The excitement did not last though as, within hours, they had been replaced with brand new ones. (thanks to Drew and Ivan)

Whilst talking of Drew, I could not help thinking about the Pub. I am not sure whether they will be speaking tonight (as a Village institution), but again thanks are in order for their Pig Racing event and thanks also to Jeremy and Carolynn Daw for the loan of the 4-legged participants. The money raised is intended to purchase a defibrillator for the Village. A reminder for your diary this year – 16 September- for a re-run. So, if you did not lose enough betting on the races last year, we will be grateful for your losings this year! And thanks also to Di Irons for organising and Chris Poad for the use of his field for the St Dominick Gymkhana.

My chat is also supposed to cover our plans for the forthcoming year. However, it will not have escaped Parishioners notice that this is an Election year, and accordingly, it would be rather presumptuous to assume that your current Councillors will be those who will be delivering such plans. I cannot remember having a Parish Council Election in the time that I have lived here, and that may well be the case this time. I do feel it is a shame that there generally aren't elections as otherwise, parishioners might well feel that their Council is not attuned to their needs. Sadly, if you have not yet put in your application papers, it is now too late to do so. However, we may be one councillor short, so please let me or the Clerk know if any of you would like to join the Council should there be a vacancy.

However, if the current Councillors continue to represent you, then amongst all the other things that are covered under routine business, they are minded to:

- Use the Burcombe donation to erect a 'Welcome to St Dominick' granite sign on the way into the Village
- Continue with the Heritage theme and try to capture old pictures and stories for an on-line archive, available to all
- Expand the Steering Committee structures to spread PC responsibilities to get greater community involvement
- Consider ways to publicise what is happening at Parish Council meetings now that our roving reporter has hung up her pen

Finally, I would like to thank our Clerk for keeping us in order and, very finally, your Councillors who have served you over the past four years since the last (non) elections. They receive no remuneration for their efforts and give of their time willingly. Perhaps you could show them a token of your appreciation in the traditional way.
