Cornwall Council Print Room, who print this newsletter, have advised the Parish Council of an imminent price increase, to cover higher paper costs and inflation. After discussion at the last Parish Council meeting, when it was stated that there had been no increase in advertising costs for at least 10 years, it was decided that the charge for a large box advert should rise to £37.50, with single line entries in the directory charged at £18 per annum.

It was also suggested that we try a new 12 or 16 page format, due to the larger number of articles coming forward. This will include the Diary Section.

St Dominick WI

On Wednesday evening (11th May) St Dominick WI had a very informative and interesting presentation, given by Ann Foweraker Murphy, about our WI Resolution to increase the awareness about women and girls with ASD (Autistic Spectrum Disorder) and ADHD (Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder) being under-identified, under-diagnosed, misdiagnosed and under-supported. We learnt that the National Federation of the WI is calling upon the Government and funding bodies to fund research into the female presentation of ASD and ADHD and also calling for action to be taken to improve the diagnosis process for women and girls, to ensure that they are equipped to better manage these conditions and do not suffer in silence.

During the second half of the evening we heard from members of the WI about their memories of being 21! What interesting lives our members have led and what lovely memories you shared, thank you.

Our next meeting will be on Wednesday 8th June at St Dominick Parish Hall and it will be a hands-on evening with Amanda Copson, where members will have a chance to create with fused glass!



The future of your Parish Church building

Below is a précis of the salient points of a much longer report given to St. Dominick Parish Council annual meeting. The full report can be seen on paper in the church or on St. Dominick Church Facebook page – even if you are not on facebook – if this is the case please put https://www.facebook.com/tamar7.org/?ti=as in the search bar and it will take you to the page – ignore requests to log-in or sign-up – it is a public page and you should be able to see it without. Note: this works best on tablets and PCs rather than phones.

The St. Dominick Parish Church building is the heritage of this parish, its namesake, its history, it's focal point for over 750 years of family celebrations, baptisms, marriages and burials, of Remembrance of those

who gave their lives in war, of celebration of the seasons and a place where the very stones seem steeped in prayer, a place of quiet, of solitude, a place of architectural and historic interest, of beauty - open to all who need it, when they need it.

Historically there has been an implicit contract with the community – that the Parish Church is supported by all as it is part of the core of the parish and is there and open for all – yet in recent times the community has withdrawn from this and the support that used to be there – is no longer.

Sadly, the custodians of this building - the people who meet in the church – are at a tipping point, too few sit in the pews to fund and run this huge heritage project as well as their main role of serving Christ in mission and ministry. Actually, the church - the people who believe in and follow the teachings of Christ - could meet and worship anywhere, as they did from the very beginning.

However, if the Parish Church is to remain part of the fabric and heritage of the community, open and available to the community when they need it, it is now obvious that neither the funds nor the people to run the maintenance of the building can be drawn just from those who believe – the implicit contract with the community needs to be restored.

This historic and Grade I listed building needs champions from the community, whether of the believing church or not, to take up the roles of protectors and preservers of this heritage unique in our parish. Without this, be assured, there will come a time when it is very likely we will see our Parish Church closed.

Goings on at the Parish council meeting May 2022

We all know what happens at this meeting, every year the same, it's change seats time. Chairman Potter opened the meeting, a bit haphazardly because Councillor Fry had to get his laptop lead ready and plugged into a socket, and then he hadn't got his glasses and his phone wasn't charged so he couldn't ring his wife. Well, they had a vote on the new Chairman, so Councillor Fry was duly elected, having been enthusiastically proposed by Councillor Cox who was looking a bit nervous and that was that. Councillor Cox was voted in as Vice Chairman, Councillors Potter, Fry and the laptop with lead swopped seats and off we went.

There are no applications to join the Parish Council, still three short. All current councillors were present and so was Cornwall Councillor Long who gave an update on various matters in East Cornwall. He did speak a few times during the following discussions but he was trying to do something on his computer and got a bit left behind.

The first bit took ages whereby the clerk had received certificates to give to those who had managed to get onto the first aid course in the hall. This had been oversubscribed and some people were disappointed in spite of the clerk squeezing in extras and somehow he had certificates for people no one had ever heard of. I don't know if he had their addresses or not, another mystery.

The minutes of the last meeting said that Councillors were all going into the wood to see where the footpaths mentioned last month were but this was thought to be incorrect. Anyway, nobody had been and also no one knew the difference between a grace and favour path and a permissive path. Probably someone will come forward and inform them. (Mentioning no names).

The sign post at Oak Tree has been hit by something and cracked. The fingers are alright, the post is fractured but not rotten and has been there for forty years. Councillor Potter to do a resurrection job. The footbridge at Burcombe has been rebuilt by the National Trust.

Councillors Shannon and Heslop last month pointed out that the cars parked near to Vogus lane junction were obscuring the view and making it dangerous

to pull out, and the bus couldn't stop very well. Double yellow lines were to be considered. Since that though, it was said that if you have yellow lines the bus can't stop. As we hardly have any buses any more this was left a bit up in the air I think, but I might be wrong. Since they have WIFI in the hall, and can use a big screen, everyone has their backs turned, away from the member of the public and me, so we can hear even less. After one particularly long opinion by someone I asked her what had been said. She told me and I asked how she knew. "Oh, they're just repeating what Dave said" was the reply......

The checks of the playing field were discussed and it was queried whether weekly was necessary or perhaps fortnightly would be alright. Eventually it was agreed that this would be the case but the inspection times were to be more regimented and weeks 1 and 3. A suggestion was made to waterproof the "bandstand" roof but councillor Potter said it was more to repair and leave it like it is, not supposed to be waterproof.

Lastly but very importantly, the cost of printing this Parish News has about doubled. This was of great concern but Councillor Cox had done lots of research as to a solution of sorts and there is a proposal to combine the Newsletter and the Diary for a start. They have been printed separately in the past but times change and it may be easier, so to take it a stage further the format is to be trialled as an A5 booklet. There followed a long, long talk about advertising costs, print sizes, advert sizes, number of pages etc. Also the difference between an informative article and an advert, so you might be now reading an unfamiliar booklet. I think someone said everyone in the parish will have a say on what they prefer – that will be interesting.

The next Council meeting is the first Wednesday in June, 7.00 at the hall but before then you will all have attended the Annual parish Meeting. I made a mistake last month, I said that the Parish Council provided the refreshments but there was no response this time. Hope you didn't all go home hungry.
