Minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting of St Dominic Parish Council held at St Dominick Village Hall on Wednesday 17th May 2023

1	Apologies. There were apologies from Parish Councillors Greene, Wilkins and Cox. Mr K Borlase, Tower Captain, and A Bellas, Litterati, also gave apologies.	
2	Minutes and Matters Arising The Minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting held on 18 th 2022 which were agreed for accuracy at the Parish Council Meeting held on the 14 th July 2022 were Proposed by Cllr Fry, seconded Cllr Shannon, All in Favour. There were no matters arising.	
3	Report from the former Chairman of the Parish Council in 2022-2023 Cllr D Fry made the following report; Good evening and thank you for attending our meeting this evening. Early June saw the play equipment removed from the small play area next to the school (slide and climbing frame) by Cllrs Dave Fry, Alan Cox, Drew Potter and our Clerk Jim Candy. Assisted in no small way by Brian Johns and his digger/concrete breaker. The direction sign was also removed from Hunters Oak and later in the year replaced by Cllr Drew Potter and his crew having been refurbished by Cllr Graham Wilkins. Installation of the new kissing gate was completed at the top of the steps near the Church on the footpath to Smeaton by Cllrs Wilkins, Fry and Cox. Medallions to commemorate the Queens Jubilee were presented at the School, to all children under the age of 11 by Cllr Fry, Cllr Cox presented the remaining medallions over the next week or so and on the Coronation Celebration day at Lovells, where the Hog roast and cream teas were funded by the P.C. There has been extensive work going on at Lovells park play area, including the replacement of the aforementioned slide which needed to be modified to remove head entrapments by Alistair Guys of Stoke Climsland carried out this work and re installed the slide in its new site up at the play area. The basket swing was also removed and was replaced by Guys. The new one having been constructed using locally sourced oak which was milled by the Guy family using their own sawmill. The assault course also had quite a lot of refurbishment work done with the replacing of much of the rotted wood which was carried out by Tamar Trades. Two defibrillator training sessions were arranged in the Parish Hall and paid for by the P.C. Coronation mugs were ordered by the P.C. to celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III. These were as before presented at	

the school to all children living in the village under the age of 11 by Cllrs Fry and Cox. Cllr Fry is still tracing the last of the eligible children living in the village and giving them their mugs. The celebrations for coronation were very successful with the P.C. again funding Hog roast and cream teas. Many thanks must go to the organisers of the two Royal events at Lovells which were both brilliant and well organised The registration of Stockwell lane as a public footpath is still in the system at Cornwall CC. The two building sites one at Sunningdale and the other at land West of the Meadows are both ticking along with the new plans for the Meadows site recently rejected by the P.C. and awaiting a decision from Cornwall C.C. The Sunningdale site is still proceeding with detailed planning to come for individual self-build sites. We have taken up the offer from Cornwall C.C to put in place a 20 mph zone throughout the village where there is a 30mph at the moment, this has been through a public consultation period and could well be implemented within the next year. Parish Councillors continue to do our WEEKLY safety checks at Lovells park play area as well as weekly checks of the de-fibs and bus shelter. This will be extended later in the year to keep an eye on the six grit bins dotted around the village. Talking of bus shelter I must thank our two talented artists Gill and Sam for all their hard work decorating the shelter for all major events and of course for Remembrance Day. I must also thank all the councillors on the P.C. and our clerk for all their support over the last year.

Cllr Fry, Chair, gave an outline of future work

We intend to carry on the refurbishments at the play park at Lovells field. Hopefully we will see Stockwell Lane becoming an official footpath. Also we hope to have the twenty mph speed zone established.

Both the Neighbourhood Development Plan and Emergency Plan need volunteers to come forward to progress.

Annual Parish Meeting reports for 17.5.2023

Cornwall Councillor

Councillor Long gave a brief overview of the past year at Cornwall Council, welcoming the abandonment of the proposal for a Mayor for Cornwall, and problems caused by underfunding.

He then gave a brief overview of the Neighbourhood Development Plan process, and benefits if one were created for the Parish.

St Dominic Parish Hall

The Hall had had a successful year, the new toilets had been installed, redecoration throughout with new fire doors, etc.

The Plant Sale had been very successful, raising over £1000 in 2 hours, the Hall had hosted part of the Jubilee and Coronation services, with many events planned for the future including the Callington Gospel Choir at Christmas.

Parochial Church Council

The Church continued to hold regular services, as it had since 1259, with new format for some services being trialled, but congregations remained small.

It was a case of use it or lose it, or the building would close.

Tamar AONB

There is a national rebranding and restructuring of AONB ongoing, with strong emphasis on Farming and Protected Landscape Schemes, which had seen strong uptake in the AONB.

The emphasis at the moment is on species recovery, and improving engagement with stake holders such as farmers, local Councils and community groups.

The Trust had had a good Spring, helped by the emphasis on “blossoms”

The project to rebuild Morden Weir was being progressed, with slightly amended plans. The wetland recreation at Hays farm was progressing well.

There are plans for a River Paddle Clean on 11th June.

There were currently 3 properties on the estate which were being refurbished, one of which required extensive work. Investment was being made on the farms on the estate, with a Silviculture project at Hays Farm.

ST. DOMINICK NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH REPORT 2022

While it was again a quiet year for crime in St. Dominick, there were some minor incidents in March, when some rubbish bins, a rubbish bag and some scaffolding boards were taken from properties in the village. In April there were reports over two days of a white transit tipper with three occupants behaving suspiciously, although no crimes were reported. We have continued to receive messages from the Neighbourhood Alert Team about missing persons in Cornwall and requests for witnesses to road accidents, although none of these have been in the village or in close proximity. Nevertheless, we have passed these on to our local members if they concern people within about twenty miles of St. Dominick.

Thanks to a grant of £200 from Cornwall Council, we have now bought new Neighbourhood Watch street signs, which are a significant deterrent to crime. Thanks to Mr Fry, who suggested at this meeting last year, that I approach our Councillor Andrew Long for a Community Project Grant from Cornwall Council and to Councillor Long, who secured the grant for us.

We are anxious to recruit new co-ordinators to give a fuller coverage to the village. A co-ordinator's job is not at all onerous. All it requires is maintaining contact with your near neighbours and providing them with information about any crime concerns in the area. We will be launching a recruitment drive over the next two months. In addition to informing our own small groups of neighbours by direct contact and e-mail, we also run a Facebook Neighbourhood Watch page and post on the St. Dominick Chat page too.

All the suspicions reported to me and other co-ordinators are passed on to the Police. However, it is always best for the actual witness of a suspicious incident to report it themselves (while informing us for the benefit of the wider neighbourhood), as their account is a first-hand one and will necessarily be most accurate. Everyone knows to ring 999 if they witness a crime or an emergency, but are sometimes more reluctant to contact the Police

about suspicions, not least because it can take a long time to get through on the 101 number for non-emergencies, but they can also contact the Police online at 101@dc.police.uk

Methodist Church

St Dominica Tower Bells

Mr K Borlase had sent apologies, with the report below:

Ringling for services has been maintained whenever possible and with the help of other ringers from the Benefice we have rung for weddings, funerals and other occasions.

Our special 2022 events began in February with celebratory ringing for the Platinum anniversary of H.M. Queen Elizabeth II. This was also Owen's 500th quarter peal. Later, in June, two call change peals marked the national jubilee event and the St. Dominick village celebrations.

Only a few months later in September we were ringing to mark the passing of the late Queen and then the Proclamation of King Charles III. Nine days later the bells were rung fully muffled with the Tenor open at backstroke on the day of the State Funeral and a single bell was tolled 96 times.

In all 5 Quarter Peals and 8 Call Change Peals were rung during 2022, the last one being for a wedding in the Church on New Years Eve.

I am pleased to report that our new learners are making steady progress and all seem keen to continue. Sessions have taken place in intensive blocks involving myself, Owen, and Sue McClaughry, with the learners now coming along to the regular Wednesday night practice evenings with the rest of the band.

The last Taylors inspection found no problems with the installation.
