St Dominick Parish Church

We are about to celebrate Easter with services at St Dominick and with the other Churches in our group, known as the Tamar Valley Benefice. We will be joining the Callington cluster of Churches and this enlarged group will be the Kit Hill Benefice; the position of Oversight Minister will be advertised in April.

Recently the new Rural Dean and Strategic lead, Rev Michael Johnson, was installed. He will oversee and lead the changes that are being made in our part of Cornwall, known as East Wivelshire Deanery, spreading from the Rame Peninsular to north of Callington.

An important part of this is to enable mission and ministry, by inspiring and supporting people, parishes and priests in all of the Churches, as well as the many lay leaders we are fortunate to have in this area. He will be working closely with Churchwardens and other office holders as well as having various specific admin roles. St Dominick was fortunate in that he was able to take the Mothering Sunday Service and was an inspiration to all.

Parish council Meeting March 2024

This was another meeting that went on for a long time with no outcomes.

No Councillor Long, he was still at work. don't forget he now holds a surgery in the silage bar of the pub once every two months, dates in the parish news, if you want to see him. The planning for the building of houses next to Stone Cross was on the agenda AGAIN and people arrived to speak against it. Basically, the plans are still contradictory and no one can make any sense of them, which the parish council knew, so, once more, it was a waste of everyone's time. The clerk is to write to the overall head of planning to complain about this being sent out incorrectly so many times etc.

We are fortunate to have had a few showers of rain, it appears to have given the road a wash on M and S corner and a white line is showing up a bit more now. That's good.

The clerk expressed surprise at the alleged tardiness of the local access team with regard to any response regarding the footpath at Dillets, but nobody fell off their chair with shock. Maybe next month.

The junior goal posts – the clerk had applied for a grant but had been refused on a procedural issue which he didn't foresee as being too much of a stumbling block and was going to try again. Then the hedge between the hall and the football field. Councillor Greene is the leader on this and would like the hedge removed so that when there is a "do" in the field people can look out the hall windows and feel "as one". That's the only way I can explain it. Also, a gate put through the hedge so they, particularly children, don't have to walk down to the road and up again to the shop. I understand there has been a meeting with the hall committee, Councillor Greene, Jim the clerk, the shop and the football club. I wasn't there, so this is what I think!

Firstly, Councillor Greene would like the hedge down, but failing that she would like all the greenery taken off the top to make it lower. The gate would have to be up by the shop otherwise parking spaces would be lost and it would have to be a selfclosing gate to conform with the ROSPA health and safety rules. There used to be a gap but this had to be closed off when the play park obtained its grant.

The parish council was concerned about the cost. The hall committee rep said they would report back to the committee. The National Trust said it wasn't worth them attending until people agreed between themselves but if the green was cut off the top other trees/bushes would have to be planted elsewhere to compensate. The football club weren't bothered, they said if they balls went over the low hedge they would be able to get through the gate to find them easily enough. I don't know what the shop said.

Anyway, each organisation is to receive two letters from the Parish council. The first to ask what they think about the hedge and the second to ask their opinion about a gate, then report back.

The only other thing of interest was the request by someone (a firm) to install electric car charging points in the parish. That will be interesting, a couple of places were suggested but not jumped upon.

And Nesta's plaque has been put back on her seat!!

Next meeting first Wednesday in April, would be nice to see some people there and it should be warmer by then.

help create 100 community-owned shops called Sadaipati in Bangladesh – and the inspirational women running these shops are transforming their communities. There will be scones with jam and cream (as well as cake!) and a table of handcrafted items for sale. Everyone welcome.



St. Dominick WI March Meeting

Members and guests of St Dominick WI were treated to a talk by Cornish Tour Guide Mark Camp on Wednesday 13th March. The topic was 'Myths and Legends of Bodmin Moor', He led us on a virtual journey around Bodmin Moor starting at Minions, including the Cheesewring, The Hurlers and Rillaton Barrow. Some of us learned that a gold cup from the Bronze Age was found in Rillaton barrow and is now on display in the British Museum. We were taken to St Neots and the fabulous church, across RoughTor (ask a local how to pronouce this!) to Altarnun then to King Donierts stones, St Bellermin, Warleggan and the story of the vicar, The Reverend Densham with a reluctant congregation, the subject of a film with a screenplay by Daphne DuMaurier. Then to Jamaica Inn and Dozmary Pool, finishing of with the story of the Cornish 'knockers' a gnome-like creature that were said to taunt miners hundreds of years ago, the knocking sound being like the sound made by the wall or ceiling of a mine before it collapsed hence the 'knockers' were dreaded. Mark also produces guide books for walks around Bodmin Moor. Our next meeting will be on Wednesday 10th April where one of our favourite speakers, Trevor Smitheram will be returning to tell us about the History of Hayle. 7.30pm in the Parish Hall, visitors welcome, £5.

Gardening Ideas

April is a very busy month for the gardener, plenty of things need to be planted. Also, perhaps it's time to look at your lawn. This year has been a bit unusual as mowing hasn't really stopped, every dry day a mower is to be heard, but now is the time to start to "put your mind to it". As there is a danger of frost



don't cut it too tight at first. Save your cuttings for your compost heap, within reason. You don't want a heap of slime. One gardener I know makes what he calls "compost tea", a lot of his bits and pieces go into a water butt to rot down, or I call it rot down anyway. The water looks like tea and he takes a dipper out when he's watering to dilute as fertilizer. His results are very good, gardeners seem to differ.

When you're mowing leave an area, if practical, with longer grass, maybe you could even put a pile of wood, decaying is best but this will soon happen on its own, for invertebrates, butterflies and insects.

Take a look at its condition. If there are bare patches rake or scarify to aerate and remove any moss etc, then scatter fine topsoil/sand with grass seed and water in, if there is a drought. Probably the whole lawn could do with a feed now.

Don't forget your ornamental pond. Now is the time to plant waterlilies and iris and to have a sort out. Try to remove blanketweed and also clean out your pump. This is not for wildlife ponds which will have newts and tadpoles now. (I do know the ornamental ponds will be full of tadpoles etc, the otters and herons will have had your fish and the wildlife ones will probably just have few mallards but never mind)

If conditions permit continue planting early potatoes. If your first earlies are showing don't forget to earth them up to protect them, there could be frost until mid May.

Leeks planted in mid April are apparently not prone to bolting and later in the month you can sow your sweetcorn. Also, you can now sow peas, beetroot, carrots, cabbage and parsnip directly into the ground.

In the greenhouse continue to sow salad crops and peppers, also start off your tomatoes, squashes, pumpkins, courgettes and similar. Don't forget to plant your herbs e.g., parsley, thyme and fennel to bring on later in May in your herb garden. Also, marigolds, clary and other bedding plants such as asters and sunflowers.

Your dahlias are safer still in the greenhouse, you can put them in a pot if they're shooting but if they go out the slugs will have them.

Cover your strawberry plants with cloches to aid flowering and fruiting.

At last, you can eat something, the rhubarb! Some should be ready now, twist the stalks, not cut them, cook and eat! Not the leaves. If you happen to have a rhubarb flower you must get rid of that as well.

If you have any surplus please remember the Parish Hall plant sale in May, but most of all as you see your efforts come to fruition, please remember to enter the Autumn Show in September. If you're not sure how to we can soon find someone to give you a hand.
