- 1. Ring 999 to inform the Emergency Services and provide
 - Clear
 - Concise
 - Actual information as soon as possible
- 2. Contact the plan volunteers
- 3. Meet at the Coordinators Assembly Point

- Contact plan volunteers with specific skills, equipment or resources who may be able to help with the emergency situation
- Contact other plan volunteers using the other Communications Tree

Section 2: Activating the community emergency plan

Until help arrives and without endangering yourself or other local people contact the appropriate members of the community listed in the plan and ask them to report to the agreed assembly point.

When the emergency services or other responders have arrived, make contact with them, explain who you are and what your role is.

- The Plan can be activated by the Emergency coordinator based on that person's assessment of the situation. It is easier to stop the plan should events come under control sooner than expected than to not respond at all.
- Sometimes full plan activation will not be required and the plan should also be seen as a resource to solve smaller issues within the community
- If details of an incident are received from a source other than the emergency services or local authority then those

receiving the notification must contact the emergency services to ensure they are aware of the incident. This may require making a 999 call.

NB: If you live in a remote location you are advised to keep the contact details of your nearest friend or neighbour within easy reach in an emergency, so you can ask them to help you contact the emergency coordinator or arrange to bring the nearest defibrillator whilst awaiting the arrival of the emergency services.

• The Parish of St Dominick includes Burraton, Bohetherick, Ashton, Halton Quay and Cotehele Mill and Quay.

Section 6: Flood planning



community flood plan

Introduction

The natural landscape of St Dominick is of steeply sloping valleys. Heavy rainfall can result in temporary flooding, particularly among properties located at valley bottoms. Flooding is exacerbated by poor maintenance of surface water drainage structures, caused by pipe blockages and surface water flows denied access to road-side ditches. River and stream levels can also be affected by high tides.

Organisations responsible for flood management

Main river. The Tamar is the only 'main' river in St Dominick. The Environment Agency (EA) is the organisation concerned to predict flooding from main rivers, to warn the public of such predictions and to operate and maintain formal flood defences. The only flood defences in St Dominick Parish are at Halton Quay, which are in the ownership of the Pentille Estate. These structures are managed by EA upstream of the Chapel dedicated to St Indract and by the Pentille Estate immediately downstream of this chapel.

Other watercourses. Oversight of non-main river watercourses is the responsibility of **Cornwall Council**, although the duty to maintain these watercourses lies with the **landowner**.

There is a duty of care on any **landowner** to accept water which runs naturally onto their property from adjacent land and a corresponding right to allow water to drain naturally off their land onto a neighbouring property.

Flooding of roads. Cornwall Council as Highway Authority in St Dominick has the responsibility to maintain existing thoroughfares, which includes ensuring roadside channels are kept available to accept all discharges landing on a maintained highway.

EA Flood Warning Advice.

The EA provide a public service to advise individual properties of flooding events in potentially vulnerable areas. In St Dominick, these potentially vulnerable areas are restricted to a few properties around Halton Quay where flooding occurs, primarily from Dairy Mill Stream (which stretches up to the Who'd Have Thought It pub) and road run-off rather than from the River Tamar.

The EA's general advice to the public can be summarised as follows:

- To find out if a property can receive automatic flood warnings, call Floodline (24-hour service) on 0845 988 1188 or go online using www.environment-agency.gov.uk/flood for flood risk forecasts, live flood warnings and alerts
- Call Floodline to secure up-to-date information about potential flooding in your area
- Call Floodline and ask for a quick-dial number can secure direct access to recorded flood warnings for any specific local area
- Listen to local radio and TV for weather information

Properties can be flooded by rising river and stream levels caused by heavy rainfall, high tides or blockages, as well as by water running off land or down roads and paths

In terms of flooding, the Environment Agency is primarily concerned with prediction, warnings and operating flood defences. It may remove blockages from Main Rivers where there is a risk to properties or life. The only Main River in the parish is the Tamar. Oversight of other watercourses is the responsibility of Cornwall Council although the duty to maintain a watercourse ultimately rests with the landowner.

There is a duty on any landowner to accept water which runs naturally from adjacent land and a corresponding right to allow water to run naturally off his/ her land.


Flooding of roads is the responsibility of Cornwall Council as Highway Authority, who employ Cormac to undertake any activity. Flooding from water supply mains or from sewers is a matter for South West Water.

People can help themselves and others by keeping road gullys free of leaves and other debris. If individual properties are vulnerable to water coming onto the land, for example from water running down a road, a ramp or stop board can be helpful. Sandbags are not generally available in a crisis and do not completely seal an opening.


Flood warnings are triggered by a combination of wind, heavy rain and high tides in the River Tamar. Within the Parish, the EA's mapping shows the area around Halton Quay which is vulnerable to flooding, the EA placed a flap valve on the outlet of Dairy Mill Stream to prevent water discharging into this catchment during high tides in the Tamar, although water can build up while it cannot discharge through the flap. If a floating log should cause this flap valve to remain shut or debris prevents it closing fully, the EA should be informed at once to ensure the flap valve is restored to working mode and properties upstream are not affected by undue storage being taken up in the Dairy Mill Stream catchment.

Flooding caused by blockages and overflows from the St Dominick Sewerage System

The control of burst water mains, leakage and overflows from public sewers is the responsibility of South West Water.

St Dominick's sewerage system has developed since World War 11 as a 'combined' system which collects both foul sewage and rainwater from roofs and hardstandings. The sewerage system is predominately a gravity system with one pumping station at Radland which transfers sewage to the treatment plant is at Bohetherick. Treated effluent is discharged directly to the River Tamar.

Maps of the sewerage system are shown below in two parts. In the upper map the purple lines show the foul sewers and the red lines show the combined sewers.



Self Help before and during a flood

People can help themselves and their neighbours by keeping road gullies free of leaves and other debris to enable storm run-off to discharge into underground pipework. If individual properties are vulnerable to water flowing onto their land, for example from run-off from a road, a ramp or a stop board can be helpful. Sandbags are generally not available in a crisis and do not completely make an opening watertight.

After long periods of light rainfall, fields become waterlogged and any further rainfall (especially heavy rainfall) will run off the fields almost immediately. Water will find its easiest flow path; that means instant run-off will often end up on the public highway, eventually ending up in the River Tamar. This process washes significant debris downhill particularly in late autumn as leaves begin to fall.

There are many locations in the Parish served by storm ditches either side of the road. Cornwall Council maintain these annually, but access from road surface to ditch often gets blocked with debris during the year when the Council is not around. Where it is practical, residents should take action to ensure these flow pathways are clear so that flash storms can drain away to ditches rather than the flow accumulating as it gathers pace down the hill towards the River Tamar.

Community Actions

In the event of floods threatening a property, the occupants may need assistance to secure valuables, mitigating damage, isolating electricity and even evacuation to alternative accommodation. The Fire and Rescue Service are there to assist and local residents should make themselves available to provide extra manpower and accommodation. Organised assistance is also available through Cornwall Council.

Actions after a Flood

EA advises that both residents and businesses in the Parish should be encouraged to make a photographic record of any damage before any clean-up, to provide evidence in the event of making an insurance claim.

In the event of flood damage being the subject for a claim, insurance companies should be contacted before discarding any damaged items, in case they require specific data in support of a claim.

The EA is also able to provide advice through www.gov.uk/prepare-for-a-flood/get-help-after-a-flood. Support for flood victims can also be sought from the British Disaster Management Association (bdma/org.uk)

Flood levels in the River Tamar and global warming

The flood defences at Halton Quay have rarely if ever been over-topped. The EA carried out pressure grouting on the flood wall facing the River during the last decade to provide a sound structure for the foreseeable future. Such works have not been carried out on the defences immediately downstream of the Chapel.

If sea level continues to rise as predicted over-topping at Halton Quay may start to be noticeable and ultimately along the more rural defences upstream. Heavy rainfall is also predicted to become more frequent, which will put more strain on the streams and surface water drainage.


