St Dominic Church Bells.

Our Church has a ring of 6 bells cast in 1773 by John Pennington of Stoke Climsland. More than likely, they were cast in the field adjacent to the tower as this is how it was done in those days! These are the current bells the village enjoys prior to Services, Weddings, Funerals, practice nights and visiting ringers.

The frame and fittings went into disrepair over the years and in 1964/65 became barely ringable. The bells, fittings and wood frame were removed from the tower in 1966. The bells travelled to John Taylor & Co. in Loughborough for synthetic tuning, removal of canons and the manufacture of new fittings. A new cast iron bell frame (4th bell above the other 5 bells) was constructed on a massive steelwork frame, lower down the tower. St Dominic Tower Captain is Kevan Borlase who has been a ringer here since the mid 1960's and learnt his craft under Les Babb, a previous Tower Captain and Churchwarden.

The Truro Diocesan Guild of Ringers was set up in 1897 and now has 1,000 or so ringers across the County. It is split into 4 Districts - Central, Eastern, Northern, Western, in which St Dominic resides in the East with around 37 towers. The Purpose of the Guild is "to advance the practice, heritage and application of bell ringing as an enjoyable, mental and physical exercise and unique performing art". Owen Borlase, Kevan's son, trained here and is the current President of the Truro Diocesan Guild of Ringers. He is only the second person in the Guild's history to be a resident of East Cornwall and has just started his third and final term of Office. We should all be very proud of Owen and the competence he brings to our village.

During Communion Services, you may well hear a single bell tolling in the Prayer of Consecration. It is Kevan who tolls this bell using the Clock Hammer three times, twice; – an age-old practice which tells those toiling in the fields the Church has reached that part of the Service, warning them to stop what they are doing, kneel and pray for a moment themselves.

We still employ Taylors to service and maintenance the bells every 12 months. Both Kevan and Owen are involved in this exercise to ensure the bells are kept in a 'Rolls Royce' condition.

It is very honorable of our own ringers to teach learners in this ancient tradition; so much so they have taught ringers from all around Cornwall's Tamar Valley and beyond. Kevan and Owen built a purpose-built 'dumbell' to teach learners, as well as improving technique of our own regular ringers.

The team practice on Wednesday evenings and are a lovely bunch of people who would make you welcome if you wanted to give it a go!

St Dominick WI - Important People of Cornwall

On Wednesday 11 June St Dominick WI welcomed back a wonderful speaker named Trevor Smitheram. Trevor travelled all the way from Hayle, with his friend as a companion for the journey, to entertain us with his talk entitled 'Important People of Cornwall'. Trevor had to select just 13 people of Cornwall who had very interesting lives and achieved some remarkable things.

He started with Elizabeth Carne who was born in 1817 and was part of the founding family of the then world famous foundry called the Cornish Copper Company.

Sir Edward Hain (1851 - 1917) during his lifetime he was involved in shipping, hospitals, hotels and newspapers (The Cornish Telegraph). He also represented the St Ives Constituency in Parliament as an MP from 1900 to 1906.

Henry Jenner was the first Grand Bard of Gorsedh Kernow in 1928.

John Knill (1733 - 1811) was the Collector of Customs in St Ives from 1762 to 1782. Knill built his own obelisk before his death then in his will he left money for the upkeep of his obelisk and money for celebrations to take place every 5 years on St James' Day which is the 25th July, celebrations that still take place today! Unfortunately, he was never buried here as he died in London.

Rowena Cade (1893 - 1983) was the 5th person to be selected by Trevor. Rowena was the creator of the wonderful cliff top Minack Theatre in Porthcurno. The picture that Trevor showed of her was brilliant; she was pictured sitting in an upturned wheelbarrow reading a book!

William Bickford-Smith (1774 - 1834) invented the safety fuse for igniting gunpowder and in 1831 he started manufacturing the safety fuses in a factory at Tuckingmill near Camborne. In it's first year his factory produced 45 miles of fuse, which of course was in high demand in a county involved in mining. In 1882 he funded the construction of the Bickford-Smith Institute and clock tower at Porthleven which was built as a Scientific and Literary Institute and included a Lending and Reference Library. You will know the clock tower from the many amazing pictures of it being battered by waves when there is a storm!

William Murdoch (1754 - 1839) is best remembered for his invention and application of gas lighting which replaced oil and tallow light.

Henry Trengrouse (1772 - 1854) was born in Helston. He invented the 'Rocket', which was a life saving apparatus that was fired across to floundering ships and shot a line out to the ship to rescue the crew or passengers.

John Passmore Edwards born near Truro in 1823. He was a journalist, newspaper owner and a member of parliament who built over 70 Institutes before his death in 1911.

Richard Trevithick (Cap'n Dick) was born in 1771. He was a former Hayle resident and once appeared on a £2 coin! He invented the first steam locomotive. There is also a song sung in his honour, which we gave our best rendition of! "Goin' up Camburn 'ill cummin down, Goin' up

Camburn 'ill cummin down, The 'orses stood still; The wheels went around, Goin' up Camburn 'ill cummin down."

In 1874 Guglielmo Marconi was born in Italy. He was an electrical engineer known for his pioneering work on long distance radio transmission. He qualifies to be in this talk because Poldhu Point on the Lizard Peninsula became the site of one of the main technological advances of the early 20th Century! It was the location of the Poldhu Wireless Station where Marconi's transmitter made the first transatlantic radio message on 12th December 1901.

The talk couldn't end without mentioning Isambard Kingdom Brunel, born in 1806, who was a famous civil and mechanical engineer. He built the Royal Albert Bridge which spans the River Tamar and links Cornwall to Devon. The bridge was tested with a 'test train' on the 11th April 1859 and officially opened on the 2nd May 1859. Interestingly, a lot of the material used to build Brunel's bridge was made by the Cornish Copper Company.

Sir Humphry Davy (1778 - 1829) is best remembered in Cornwall for his invention of the Miner's Safety lamp or Davy Lamp.

The final person that Trevor selected was Cyril Richard "Rick" Rescorla was born in Hayle in 1939 and died saving over 2700 lives in The Twin Towers disaster on September the 11th, 2001 (9/11) in New York.

I imagine you could probably add other interesting and innovative people to this list who have links to Cornwall! Well there was one final surprise: as the curtains opened on the last slide of Trevor's talk, a picture of Kate Wilkinson was revealed!! Our President of St Dominick WI and a very important person of Cornwall!

Marion delivered a vote of thanks from us all by presenting Trevor with a map of Cornwall with many Important People of Cornwall written on it.

Our next meeting will take place on Wednesday 9th July at 7.30 for 7.45 start, in St Dominick Parish Hall and our talk will be given by Black Dog Bees, who are beekeepers and conservationists. They will bring along some of their delicious honey and bee related products to buy. July gardening notes

July can be one of the hottest months of the year making it a great time to be relaxing in your garden and enjoying your outside space. However, there are some extra precautions to be aware of if the weather is hot and dry.

This will include:

Mulching around plants and shrubs to retain moisture

Keeping pots/containers/hanging baskets from drying out.

Also, the green house will need extra watering, hopefully with saved or grey water, when possible, (watering first thing in the morning or in the

evening will help to cut down on evaporation) and weeds can be hoed off and left to dry in the sun.

In the flower garden dead head bedding and perennial plants as the flowers fade; by deadheading regularly it is possible to keep plants flowering until the first frosts come. Faded perennial plants can be cut back in order to keep borders tidy and to encourage new growth. Cuttings from tender plants can be taken now for over wintering indoors as well as cuttings from border perennials. If you are lucky enough to have a deciduous magnolia, that will have already flowered, then it is a good time to prune it in July.

In the greenhouse continue to pinch out tomato sideshoots and cut off any leaves growing below the lowest ripening fruit trusses to aid air circulation and prevent disease. A weekly application of liquid feed will help to boost the tomato crop at this time of year.

In order to save space cucumber plants can be trained up canes or wires and the growing tips of courgette and squash plants can be nipped off to encourage bushiness.

If you have grown broad beans and finished harvesting them cut the plants off just above ground level. Compost the tops but leave the roots in the ground to fix nitrogen in the soil. This will improve the soil fertility for future crops.

This also applies to runner beans and french climbing beans. Talking of which by the end of July and into August runner beans should be ready for harvesting and will need regular picking to prevent the beans from becoming tough, also to encourage the plant to keep producing more. Taking the growing tips from the top of the plants when they reach the top of their supports will encourage side shoots lower down and prevent the plant from become top heavy.

If you grow rhubarb then remember not to over- harvest it from now on as leaving plenty of stems and leaves on the plants will feed and strengthen it for a better harvest next year. As gardeners we should always be thinking ahead and now is the best time to plant out winter cabbage that were grown from seed in the early spring to mature in the winter and beyond.

Although, hopefully, we will be enjoying the hot and dry weather in July the wildlife in our gardens will still need some help. We can do this by taking steps such as keeping birdbaths and ponds topped up and ensuring that there is a clean source of water available for a birds and animals, such as hedgehogs. Remember it is very important to keep your birdfeeders/ feeding areas and baths clean to prevent a build up of bacteria.

Please be careful when strimming/trimming as there could be young hedgehogs and other small mammals or reptiles around that could be harmed so please check first. Also it is a good idea to delay the hedge trimming for as long as possible to allow the nesting birds to fledge.

As you may know by now there is a virus spreading through Southern England causing a significant decline in blackbird numbers. If possible, please take part in the BTO.org blackbird survey, which runs until October as this will help to monitor the spread and severity of this disease.

Whilst on the subject of surveys please don't forget the Big Butterfly Count 2025 which takes place between the 18th July and 10th August 2025.

By taking part in surveys like these you will be providing information that may help to prevent the decline of our precious and vulnerable wildlife.

Outwitting voles and mice

Are you bored of pesky rodents munching your pea seeds before they get a chance to grow? One way to outwit them is to start the peas in pots and transplanting later. Peas do not like their roots being disturbed. So I experimented making my own pots which come apart easily.



1. Cut some spare pond liner (or something similar) into 16cm squares

 Roll up and secure (cable ties or elastic band)

3. Put an inch of compost in bottom of a

larger pot, put the home-made pots in the larger pot and fill each one with compost.

4. Put 2 pea seeds in each one and push down into the compost, then water well.

5. Look after them for about 3 weeks and they will be ready to plant out

6. Open each pot and place the pea plant into a prepared trench

The above may seem a bit of a faff but it works and the peas are delicious

Residents Questionnaire feedback;

Many residents completing the questionnaire were unhappy with the current bus service to and from the village. Local Councillor Andrew Long, attended a meeting with the bus company about the No.12 bus, I'm sure he will update us on his progress.

I contacted the Saltash Red Bus team and discussed options for future use of their services to St Dominick, which they are happy to provide to our residents. They have a monthly trip to a large supermarket, plus weekly to Waitrose, monthly to Asda in Leigham, Tesco at Lee Mills, Sainsburys at Marsh Mills, Morrisons in Plympton, also M&S and Aldi at Derriford. You will have 1.5h to shop. All £3. They have a weekly Sunday lunch trip to a variety of venues for £8 for the journey. They run a number of day trips to places such as Newton Abbott, Polperro, Tavistock, Truro, Kingsbridge. Plus evening trips to Tavistock Wharf, Theatre Royal Plymouth, Windy Ridge and others.

In the last Parish News I requested residents who may be interested in using the Saltash Red Bus or an improved No 12 Go Cornwall bus service, to let me know so we can negotiate a service that residents would use. I have not had any responses yet.

I'll leave a few copies of the current Saltash Red Bus trips in the Community Shop.

Parish Council Report June 2025

If I thought there were a lot of loose ends to tie up last time, this was twice as bad.

There were no Councillors Wilkins nor Greene but we did have Cornwall Councillor Long at the beginning to tell us what was happening in the world, or around East Cornwall anyway. He was congratulated on retaining his seat on the council in the recent elections.

We started with public question time and this month we had two MOPs, one of whom was ex councillor Heslop who had come with a complaint about the state of Vogus Lane, namely the hedges and lack of tarmac. Councillor Long had to tell him that there was hardly any chance of getting tarmac down there, given the state of the more widely used roads in the country but he would ask.

Then a parishioner asked about getting a speed limit along Tipwell, which has been requested many times over the years. This was on the agenda for later on but was brought forward for discussion whilst Andrew was still there. Councillor Brady reiterated what the MOP said, which was a narrow road, single vehicle passing places and signs in the wrong place, no pavement nor street lights. They stressed that places like St Ive had speed limits although they had pavements etc.

Councillor Long said he would certainly bring it up again with, I think, Highways, but he didn't hold out much hope. St Ive has more traffic amongst other things. He did say he had to be realistic and peoples' opinions of dangerous didn't always/but sometimes did match reality and there were no accident figures for that road. With regard to the "slow" signs being in the wrong place he said he would bring that up as well but that didn't mean they would necessarily be altered. Ongoing!

Councillor Long is to meet Dan Rogerson, portfolio holder for buses, soon, to see if we can get some buses reinstated. There are articles elsewhere in this newsletter to remind you of the Tamar Valley Community Bus and Saltash Red Bus. The footpath at Dillets was brought up **<u>again</u>**, there has been no assistance from Cornwall Council as yet.

The long awaited ROSPA report on Lovells park was discussed. There are no "red" flags but several notes of impending doom, words like "worn" and "rotten" and "entrapment" seemed to fly around. Then they said there was nothing desperate. Councillor Wenmoth, who had obviously been taking it all in, asked whether they would need to take a screwdriver on their future monthly safety checks to stick into the wood, it did sound a bit like that. The decision was to get an estimate from a professional company to assess what was important and then to do bits of work themselves and pay for the rest – all as usual then. Councillor Fry is to take a jemmy bar up there and take the protective plastic off the wooden legs as that was causing rot.

Then something very confusing came up. The pink bin – the one that would cost £600 to replace and £440 a year to empty – now can stay and will have a phone number on it. When its full, ring up and someone will empty it. Now, does that make sense, who knows? Also, the Housing Association, who apparently have always paid for the one at Baber, aren't going to pay any more, so will the Parish Council take it on? I think an appeal is going in.

Then pages and pages of audit figures etc. Not only that but it was the meeting, where the clerk had to individually read out all the code of good practice that had been followed during the year. After each item they had had to say "Aye" or "Nay". It went on and on, so much so that at the end when the clerk said it was time for him to have a new laptop, the old one being completely out of date and beyond updating, they just agreed it immediately (it has been imminent for a few years now).

Councillor Potter suggested the Annual Parish Council meal be reinstated and everyone agreed, they were worn out. The only proviso from Councillor Wenmoth that it mustn't be the same day as the Hobbies group lunch. Then the worst thing ever, just when everyone thought it was over, the Clerk, Jim, resigned. They knew it was very possible because he is now a Cornwall Councillor and the workload is just too much but there was hope he would find a way. I think his wife has laid down the law. He said he would stay on until they found another. Councillor Potter thanked him very much for his work over the years. He said that during his time as Chairman it was always possible to contact him any day or time, including weekends and, of course, having been a councillor himself, he knew exactly who to contact with problems or to get advice etc., also how to ring people up and not be waiting for emails to be returned for weeks. He might come on the meal.

So, he will probably be there for the next meeting and there might be someone new.


Welcome Booklet

St Dominick Snooker Club

Here is an update on some of the changes that have happened at the club over the last few years and the improvements we have made. Thanks to some generous local donations we have replaced the ageing outer door and fitted an electric key fob entry system. We have also replaced the inner door together with a glass pane displaying our club logo. The front wall of the building had become porous which caused large amounts of damp inside. Over time this caused the floor boards to rot where they touched the wall and we needed to replace 60% of them. We slate hung the front of the building which prevented any further water penetration. We were then able to replace the carpet clear out the old storage room at the back of the building and had a kitchen installed.

In 2023 we celebrated the clubs centenary and created a remembrance wall where we displayed the snooker cues of players who have passed away. We have also had heater fitted to both tables.

Many of these improvements have been possible because of the hard work of the current committee and club members.

The club is fortunate to have some very experienced long term dedicated members who have given hundreds of hours practicing and improving their skills. Their commitment is largely unknown and has gone unrecognised outside the world of snooker but it is fair to say their achievements are unparalleled in Cornwall. We are fortunate to have two county champions as current members and we will soon be erecting an honours board which will list the clubs massive success in the last 25 years.

Here are the clubs results this season:

St Dominick won the Liskeard Premier League and Liskeard Knockout Club

Tony Farrant had the highest break of 86 and is also the leagues singles winner. He is also the Liskeard League doubles winner together with Martin Pitcher and Liskeard League over 50s winner. St Dominick are also the County Team Champions, and Chris Bond, Andy Pearce and Tony Farrant play snooker for the Cornwall county team. Billiards also features with Ian Hunn playing in The County Team. We currently have 55 members of all abilities and get a regular training session from Darran Locke who hosts a You Tube snooker channel called "A break from life". We keep all our members updated by sending out a quarterly newsletter by email.

Cost of joining is £35 annually and with Father's Day coming up this may be the ideal gift.

We have some female members and would like to encourage younger members to try out this enjoyable sport. Anyone can join over the age of 14 yrs. Application forms can be obtained from any committee member or at the Whod have Thought it Pub.

We have a new Bishop in Cornwall!

The Rt Revd David Williams was installed as Bishop of Truro on 17th May, 2025 at a service of welcome in Truro Cathedral.

During the service, Bishop David took his place in the official Bishop's chair and was presented with Bishop Benson's 'crosier' (pastoral staff). This constitutes a special link with Edward White Benson who was consecrated the first Bishop of Truro in 1877, before he went on to become an Archbishop of Canterbury in 1883.

Bishop David was formerly the Suffragan Bishop of Basingstoke, in the diocese of Winchester. We have swapped Bishops with Winchester as Bishop Philip, the former Bishop of Truro, has been 'translated' to Winchester as their new diocesan Bishop. The Church of England is full

Bishop David was born in Reading, but spent his childhood in Uganda, returning to this country for secondary school and Bristol University. He then spent several years in Kenya teaching with the Church Mission Society, before studying for ordination at Wycliffe Hall, Oxford.

His first post in 1989 was as a curate of All Saints, Eccleshall in the Sheffield Diocese and then as vicar of Christ Church, Dore. He moved from Sheffield in 2002 to become vicar of Christ Church in Winchester and was 'elevated' to become suffragan Bishop of Basingstoke in 2014.

In a recent statement, Bishop David said: "I am, at heart, a parish priest. I want to continue working for the flourishing of local churches. The local church is vital to a local community. It's a place where we encounter God. It's a place where you're encouraged and comforted when you're in trouble".

We are very lucky to have such an experienced priest coming to Cornwall to lead our Diocese. Together with the Rt Revd Hugh Nelson, Suffragan Bishop of St Germans, we are convinced the leadership of the Truro Diocese is in good hands. We hope Bishop David, our new Bishop, will soon be able to visit one of the many churches in our benefice and we wish him well in his new ministry!
